


as always with volunteer numbers.

Financial update

The cash balance at year end was over £25,000 which represents a solid reserve for the group. However, it has been another financially challenging year for the group with the accounts for 2024 on pages 6 & 7 showing a small surplus. This surplus is mainly due to gift aid claims (£3479) backdated by 3 years, without which we would have seen a significant shortfall.

Outgoings continue to put pressure on our financial sustainability, mainly due to increased cost of capitation, insurance and energy. Capitation is our contribution to the wider scouting organization and now takes 50% of our subscription fees, which is intended to cover day-to-day operations of the group and various section activities.

We have had some significant pressures from many places, utility bills through to scouting fees. As well as the seemingly never-ending maintenance on the old hut and its roof. Finally, a big thank you to all of you and everyone who ensures the children can attend, who volunteer and who engage in all the many Scouting sessions, it is fantastic to see the impact it has on the young people and to see their self-confidence grow.

We're buzzing for the next term and can't wait for even more fun, friendship, and adventure with our amazing Scouts!



We aim for events such as camps and days out to be cost neutral, although any surplus or deficit is covered by group funds.

The group has three main sources of income:

• Subscription charges, which are intended to cover the day-to-day costs of our scouting activities. These were last increased in 2022 but due to rising operating costs, your Board of Trustees has decided to make a further increase to make sure we are sustainably funded for the year ahead.



- Gift Aid. We can claim back 25p from the Government for every £1 we take in donations, including the subscription charge. If you pay tax on your income and have not already done so, please update your settings on OSM to include Gift Aid we are currently missing out on nearly £1000 of funding via Gift Aid.
- **Fundraising** The fundraising group makes a significant contribution to group funds, but it could do far more if there were more volunteers to help organize and deliver events to bolster our finances. If you don't already do so, please consider supporting the group with its future fundraising activities.

Any shortfall that is not covered by fundraising, donations or gift aid is taken out of the group reserves.
